Conservation is a Team Sport!

In times of crisis, the strengths and weaknesses of a team are amplified, and we can see that all around us in today's COVID-19 world. Whether we are socially isolated or not, the networks we weave and the way we interact with one another determine whether we can continue delivering on our mission, garner critical financial and community support, and survive and thrive as individuals and families. This is why I want to take a moment to focus on the IRC team of employees, associates, board members, funders, community supporters, and conservation colleagues. Because together we comprise an amazing team!

Mostly behind the scenes, Samantha Gabriel delivers critical support for administration, finance, media & publications, and human resources. She helps plan and staff our events, and many of you may have seen her recently at one of our Restoring the Gold Coast volunteer days. Education and Outreach Coordinator, Cara Abbott, continues to deliver excellence through adapting our Restoring the Gold Coast program, posting content on Facebook, and increasing our media resources in response to social distancing. Our financial support base has been growing, and in 2019 we received more than \$25,000 in individual and business support from more than 100 donors for Restoring the Gold Coast, Natives For Your Neighborhood, and general support. So far in 2020, we have raised just over \$30,000, including an incredibly generous general donation of \$25,000 this month from an anonymous donor. These donations are key to IRC surviving the COVID-19 crisis and thriving into the future. We have also done well with institutional support, including significant donations in 2019 from Impact 100 Palm Beach County, New York Life, and the Florida Wildflower Foundation. Key grant support from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for our work on globally imperiled pine rockland restoration is expected to continue into 2021.

Volunteers at events, researchers and citizen scientists who provide photographs and data for our websites, and collaborators at myriad nonprofits, universities, and government agencies, are all also part of the IRC team, as are community supporters in Florida, the Caribbean, and around the world. We should also acknowledge the families of all of those listed here since their support for our work has never been more clear in this age of family sheltering.

Moving forward, we will continue to expand capacity for those interested in IRC to contribute, including the formation of an Michelle Smith, Field Biologist, are hard at work improving our in-field restoration and science practices, focusing on pine rocklands and invasive species.

Our 13 research and conservation associates continue to do incredible work at their respective institutions, and support IRC's mission through collaboration and data sharing. Examples are Jimmy Lange, hard at work increasing our knowledge of rare and locally extinct plants in Broward County, Kirsten Hines, traveling the state working on a new Florida wildlife book, and Mike Barry, who has been mapping vegetation change at Bahia de Jobos National Estuarine Research Reserve in Puerto Rico.

Our 7-member board continues to deliver leadership and continuity throughout the crisis. Co-founders Robert Heinzman (VP) and Donna Shore (Sec./Treas.) play key roles in executive decision-making from Massachusetts and California respectively. Our South Florida directors John Campanola, Patty Phares, and Allison Turner help us stay connected to our local communities, and our international director, Kingsley Dixon from Australia, makes sure we keep our eye on the big picture.

Coastal Consultation

IRC's Chief Conservation
Strategist, George Gann, is now conducting on-site visits and evaluations of privately-owned properties on the barrier islands of southern Palm Beach County. We are working to improve coastal resilience and sustainability by increasing the diversity of native plants and habitats.

We are offering an introductory rate of \$100 for an initial 45-minute visit and \$100 per hour thereafter.

Any privately-owned property with existing or potential for native coastal habitat is eligible, from single-family homes to condominium associations and other multi-family properties.
