### **Gratitude and Hope**

I am glad that Extinction Rebellion exists to antagonize the authorities, and that Greta Thunberg won Person of the Year for her outspoken work on climate change. And I have read with interest the media follow-up to the 11th Annual Southeast Florida Regional Climate Leadership Summit in Key West. It is obvious that business as usual just won't work when it comes to climate change and the global biodiversity extinction crisis. And people are (finally) taking note.

But I worry. I worry that despair will overcome us, and society in general. That politicians and the courts will be too slow to act, and that we will expend too much energy fighting over who gets to profit from global change. I worry that we will not take full advantage of all of the conservation work that has been accomplished to date, and that we will fail to acknowledge that we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us, who set the stage for this fight for survival of species, and human evolution toward a sustainable relationship with our planet.

As 2019 winds down I want to take this opportunity to say that, despite all the setbacks and challenges, I am excited to be alive and in this fight. I am grateful that there are patches of biodiversity left along the Florida coast; that we have scraps of Everglades with which to work; that we have 2% of pine rocklands instead of zero; that I get to work with amazing people of all ages and walks of life; and for a wonderful family and community of

The future will be a battle, that is for sure. We must achieve transformational change, and that change will be resisted by many for reasons good and bad. But we cannot achieve transformational change through classical environmental resistance and advocacy alone. It must be created within a context of healing, both environmental and social; through the lens of ecological restoration and other allied restorative actions, from organic and regenerative agriculture to native pollinator gardens and green infrastructure. And I believe that every person can do something restorative in life. Not just reducing impacts on the environment, but participating in the great planetary healing that is critically needed. And needed right now. That, my friends, gives me hope.

## **IRC's 2019 Project Spotlight**

## **Restoring the Gold Coast**



With our \$100,000 Impact 100 PBC grant, \$10,000 New York Life Grant, and contributions from supporters like you, IRC has kickstarted our new Restoring the Gold Coast program. This year, IRC has conducted various events from Boca Raton to Ocean Ridge as part of this coastal dune restoration project. IRC has held five hands-on volunteer events, including our Kick-Off event and field trips with local high schoolers, three inschool lectures, a workshop, and various talks and site evaluations. For this upcoming year, IRC plans to work with students of all ages, and coordinate general volunteer restoration events, lectures, and workshops throughout southern Palm Beach County.

#### Pine Rockland Initiative





With \$95,000 in funding from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and in collaboration with the Miami-Dade County EEL program and other partners, IRC continues to conduct ecological restoration activities in globally imperiled pine rocklands in Miami-Dade and Monroe counties. In the past two years, IRC's field crew has worked on over 150 acres of pinelands at 15 sites, treating non-native, invasive plants and reducing cover of native hardwoods that have expanded due to fire suppression.

We have also been working on cultivating, planting and monitoring Pineland croton (*Croton linearis*) at the National Key Deer Refuge in Monroe County. This project aims to increase the food source for the federally endangered Bartram's scrub-hairstreak (*Strymon acis bartramii*) butterflies, as Pineland croton is the only host plant.

We are also working with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Nature Conservancy, Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden and other partners on the development of a Pine Rockland Business Plan, an innovative planning tool intended to help scale up the restoration of existing pine rocklands and "Expand the Footprint" of this imperiled ecosystem.

SECOND EDITION SUMMARY



This September, IRC, the Society for Ecological Restoration (SER), and more than a dozen other organizations from around the world released the second edition of the International Principles and Standards for the Practice of Ecological Restoration. Introduced in 2016, the Standards establish norms to guide the development and implementation of ecological restoration projects worldwide. The updated Standards were announced at SER's 8th World Conference on Ecological Restoration in Cape Town, South Africa, where nearly 1,000 delegates from around the world convened to discuss the

issues, challenges, and opportunities surrounding restoration. IRC Chief Conservationist, George Gann, the lead author of the updated Standards, was on hand to deliver a keynote address. IRC will continue to collaborate with SER in 2020 in preparation for the World Conservation Congress in Marseille, France (June), the 2020 United National Biodiversity Conference in Kunming, China (October), and the launch of the 2021-2030 UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (January 2021).
