Monthly Conservation Notes

IRC co-leads development and launch of new international Standards for ecological restoration

It is fitting that during our 35th anniversary year, IRC helped lead a global effort to update and expand guidance on developing, implementing, and monitoring ecological restoration projects in any ecosystem anywhere in the world. Following a nearly three-year effort, the Society for Ecological Restoration (SER), IRC, and more than a dozen participating institutions launched the International Principles and Standards for the Practice of Ecological Restoration, Second Edition, at the 8th World Conference on Ecological Restoration in Cape Town, South Africa. More than 800 conference delegates, including representatives of the United Nations Environmental Programme, UN Food, and Agricultural Organization, and the South African government were on hand for the launch.

With pressure mounting for massive investment in climate change mitigation and adaptation, and the restoration of degraded lands, the restoration Standards are a critical resource to help ensure that global restoration efforts maximize conservation and ecosystem services benefits, and do not cause unintended harm or fail. I had the honor of leading a group of 16 scientists and restoration practitioners from seven countries in preparing this document. It was peer-reviewed and is available as a special issue of the journal Restoration Ecology.

While global restoration Standards may seem esoteric and unrelated to our work in Florida and the Caribbean, nothing could be further from the truth. Because the Standards were developed by practitioners, like me, together with internationally renowned restoration scientists, they are built for everyday practice on the ground, and in the water. In fact, IRC is already using the updated Standards for two of our projects, Restoring the Gold Coast and our Pine Rockland Initiative. Tools like the Social Benefits Wheel help us to track the effects of our work on the community, and we are using the Standards to help build reference models for the restoration of criticallyimperiled pine rocklands in Miami-Dade County. We are proud of this contribution and hope you will take the time to take a look.

IRC's International Coastal Cleanup Event at ADP

Our International Coastal Clean-Up event at Atlantic Dunes Park was a HUGE success, despite the wind and rain. With almost 100 volunteers, we worked together to remove 64.98 kg of trash (which was mostly comprised of microplastics) and 27.75 kg of recyclables off the beach. Some of the weirdest trash items people found were: a shoe sole, a tent, a Juul pod, a barrette, and wire!

Since this event was also part of our Restoring the Gold Coast Program, participants helped us increase coastal biodiversity by planting native Saw palmetto and Spanish stopper and removing invasive Bowstring hemp (Snake plant), Brazilian pepper, and Beach naupaka.
