#### 35 Years of Service

2019 marks the 35th anniversary of the Institute for Regional Conservation, an organization that has grown from the dreams and aspirations of college students at the University of Colorado to an organization working at the cutting edge of conservation and ecological restoration locally, regionally, and around the world.

We have so much to be grateful for, including the support of family, friends, and community. - International Coastal Cleanup, September 21st: 9:00 am 12:00 pm. Join IRC at Atlantic Dunes Park in Delray Beach for the International Coastal Cleanup. This event is in partnership with Keep Palm Beach County Beautiful and the City of Delray Beach.
- 8th World Conference on Ecological Restoration, September 24th- 28th: Our Chief Conservation Strategist, George Gann, will be attending the 8th World Conference on Ecological Restoration on in Cape Town, South Africa. The day before the conference he will be co-leading the Second Biennial Global Forum on Ecological Restoration, where 40 invited scientists, policymakers, and practitioners will brainstorm about scaling up restoration around the world. At the conference, the Second Edition of the International Principles and Standards for the Practice of Ecological Restoration will be launched. IRC is one of three main contributors to that document, along with the Society for Ecological Restoration, and the Society for Ecological Restoration Australasia. George will participate as a Keynote Speaker at the closing plenary, contributing to the discussion of mainstreaming and scaling up restoration in the coming decade.
- IRC at Palm Beach FNPS & Audubon Everglades Meeting, October 15th: 7:00 pm 9:30 pm. George Gann will speak at a joint meeting of the Palm Beach County Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society and Audubon Everglades on October 15th at Mounts Botanical Garden. George will speak about the IRC program, from local efforts to global policy, including Restoring the Gold Coast, Natives For Your Neighborhood, and the new edition of the International Restoration Standards.
